# Improving Space, Improving Service

You also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." — 1 Peter 2:5

In the span of a couple days, two extremely fortunate blessings occurred for Groce's buildings.

Due to financial constraints, Groce paused a contractor who was going to seal the sidewalk joints on both sides of the sanctuary which were letting water into the walls of Charter Hall below the rear of the sanctuary. In researching how to do the work ourselves, True contacted Jeff Welty of High Rock Waterproofing, a firm in Winston-Salem True had used on Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center facilities, for technical guidance. Jeff's response was, "I think I can do better than that. The community service project for our professional association's conference in October fell through and we need a new community service project."

After a lot of detailed planning as well as removal of the existing sealant by Julie **Arnall, Chuck Hunner and True,** members of the Carolinas Chapter of the **International Concrete Repair Institute** sealed all the sidewalk joints on Wednesday, October 15<sup>th</sup> saving Groce \$3,000. In addition to Adam Nagy and Jeff of High Rock Waterproofing doing installation and providing a 2-man crew, Guaranteed **Supply** provided all the materials, **Stone Restoration** provided a 3-man crew and **Stewart Swing of Terracon Engineering** helped install. Thanks also to Groce's **Bob** Briggs and Joe Early setting up barriers, temporary signage, sealant protection and getting Jeff's team started.

As another example of God's abundance, **Andrew Sheffield of Interior Painting of Asheville** (based in the former Swannanoa Cleaners building) called True to follow up on a proposal. He shared that he and his wife Rachel, whose business is now five years strong, wanted to give back to the community. Moved by Groce's impact in the community, they offered to help Groce with its painting needs while training new crew members with strong supervision.

After walking through all of Groce's buildings, Andrew and Rachel insisted that everything was on the table. Together with Will and True, they created a prioritized list from fascia boards to sanctuary walls. The first project was repainting the doors of tenant spaces on the upper level of the Epworth Building with the branding colors of the tenants, an idea sparked by Marsha van Rijssen.

**Interior Painting of Asheville** is now also working with Amy Guidash of Warrior Canine Connection to paint the organization's new space on Epworth's lower level. Andrew, Rachel, and their son Lucas recently attended the Helene Remembrance Community Picnic.

The work will occur based on Interior Painting of Asheville's availability, but we are extremely grateful for what Andrew and Rachel have already done and will tackle in the future. Groce and Interior Painting of Asheville are working towards a long term and mutually beneficial relationship.



We are still pinching ourselves that both of these things occurred, especially right on top of each other. Thanks be to God.

# TL3 Meeting Notes

October 21, 2025

### LOVING

- 1. The group shared blessings and concerns about each other as well as other members of the Groce church family.
- 2. Rocky opened the meeting in prayer

### LEARNING

1. 9/16 meeting notes were approved.

### **LEADING**

- 2. Approval of pastor's 2026 salary amount
  - a. Jill shared that her salary amount needs to be approved by Groce leadership in advance of the November 16th charge conference so it can be submitted to the Conference by the deadline.
  - b. Rocky made a motion to approve the pastor's salary at \$90,234 (2025 salary amount). Loring seconded the motion.
  - c. Discussion
    - i. While the group would rather see an increase (for all staff to at least reflect the cost of living changes) this cannot be decided in time to meet the submission deadlines since we will not know the results of the stewardship campaign for the 2026 budget.
    - ii. If an increase can be funded by Groce for 2026 it would be made in the form of a bonus payment in 2026 and then incorporated into the 2027 salary.
    - iii. Jill needs two members of the leadership team to attend the charge conference at 3 p.m. on November 16th at Covenant Community Church near Reynolds High School.
  - d. The motion was approved with all in favor.
- 3. Approval of the 2026 leadership positions
  - a. Jill presented the 2026 leadership directory for approval.
  - b. Jill made a motion that the presented leadership list be approved as submitted. Rocky seconded the motion.
  - c. Discussion
    - i. Various discussions occurred reviewing committees and individual roles with emphasis on all the things being accomplished by the committees, especially the ministry teams.
  - d. The motion was approved with all in favor.
- 4. 10/26 Church Family meeting presentation and 2025 stewardship campaign
  - a. Gary began by reviewing the concepts behind this year's stewardship campaign and the need for the leadership team to provide input to the information being presented
  - b. Stewardship campaign
    - i. Gary walked the group through each of the slides. Discussion occurred so the group understood the content and intent. Adjustments were made to the slides in the meeting to reflect the input.

- ii. Will shared information about the Facilities Fund Essential and Aspirational Goals.
- lii. In response to Diane's question about the status of being able to make automated calls to the congregation, Will shared that the present upgrade occurring to the phone system will put us in a position to then acquire these capabilities.
- Iv. The group was supportive of the campaign approach and the information being provided. There was acknowledgement that some in the audience might want more detail of what makes up the budget categories being used in the campaign. The group looked at the detail behind these categories. The mailed/emailed cover letter should convey that if someone wants to understand more detail, they can contact Gary or Jim Ariail as we always do with financial information instead of providing account level detail reports that require explanation to properly understand.

# Log Cabin Award

Groce has been honored by the Western North Carolina Conference with recognition of our service to the communities impacted by Hurricane Helene. The award has been carefully placed in Asbury Hall. An image of the award, and a transcription of its description, is below.

"Quilting has long been identified as an arts and crafts endeavor closely linked to mountain culture. Of necessity those who settled in these areas needed the warmth that a guilt provided, and they could be made from scraps and remnants of cloth. There was a functionality and economy to the craft that suited life on the frontier, while beauty and creativity were sewn into what remained of worn clothing and sewing scraps.

This design is the Log Cabin Block. The center red square represents the hearth fire and the heart of the home. The block features an array of "logs" or strips of fabric that build upon one another in a circular motion, similar to the way log cabins were



once built. The strips are light on one side of the diagonal and dark o0n the opposite side, signifying both the beauty and the challenges of life itself. The blue fabrics represent the beautiful hues of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

This quilt block has been crafted with love and given to Groce United Methodist Church in sincere appreciation for your continuing gifts of service to those affected by Hurricane Helene. In our darkest hour you have been the hands and feet of Christ to those in need, helping us to rebuild the heart of the home in our Blue Ridge Mountains.
